The Hoover Mason Trestle (HMT) was once used as a narrow gauge railroad to carry the coke, limestone and iron ore needed to make the iron from the ore yards to the blast furnaces. Now a public walkway and outdoor museum, the trestle stands 46 feet tall and 2,000 feet long. It is located along the blast furnaces.
